### ***From Rookie to Retirement: 25 years in CASEA***

*I was a PhD student at the University of Alberta in 1994, desperately trying to get my head around Evers and Lakomski [Knowing educational administration, 1991], when Margaret Haughey suggested we travel south to Calgary for CASEA. It was a terrifying prospect but Geoff Riordan, Jerome Delaney and I took her up on the suggestion, and submitted papers which – amazingly to us – were accepted. So down Highway 2 we went, and had a great time, and met all sorts of famous EdAdminers whose work we had been reading. Over the past quarter-century I have attended all except perhaps three or four of our conferences, and through these have met some amazing people who have become both friends and colleagues.
