

As part of a major expansion of its research programs in 2021, the Faculty of Education at the University of Ottawa invites applications for a tenure-track position.

The Faculty of Education is located on the unceded ancestral territories of the Anishinabé-Algonquin people in the heart of the nation's capital. With more than sixty professors, we offer an exceptional intellectual environment to students, educational researchers, and professors. This recruitment also reflects the Faculty of Education's 2025 strategic plan, which focuses on innovation; educational technologies; a vibrant Francophonie; Indigenous rights; antiracisms, equity and social justice.

**Title of the position:** Black Youth Studies (assistant professor, teaching in the Anglophone sector)

We are seeking applicants who can contribute to the existing research in Black Youth Studies that intersects with areas such as, but not limited to: history education, social studies, leadership education, curriculum studies, cultural studies, Black futurities, anti-oppressive education, Black Diaspora, feminist, queer and transgender studies, critical theory, disability studies, and/or Black excellence.

We invite candidates who are committed to strengthening our existing interdisciplinary relations with other faculties (e.g., Social Sciences, Arts, Science, Medicine, Health Science), school boards, and community organizations who seek to enhance the research and educational opportunities specifically for Black youth here in Canada and the world.

**Duties:** The functions of a member of the academic staff include, in varying proportions: a) teaching activities; b) scholarly activities revealed by research, artistic or literary creation, or professional work; c) academic service activities, d) supervision of graduate students.

**Terms:** Tenure-track position (Assistant Professor)

**Wage:** Salary scale for an Assistant Professor starts at \$88,735 (as of May 1, 2022)

**Benefits package:** The University of Ottawa provides a complete benefits package, which includes long-term disability, basic group life insurance, supplementary health insurance, University of Ottawa Pension Plan and optional life insurance, as well as relocation expenses.

- **Education:** Ph.D. or equivalent in Education. Postdoctoral experience in Black Youth Studies and/or related field of study.
- **Work experience:**
  - A demonstrated excellent research track record in Black Youth Studies and/or related field of studies.
  - A demonstrated track record in teaching and training at the graduate level, teacher education, and a strong track record in interdisciplinary collaboration.
  - Excellent communication skills in English. Passive knowledge of the other official language in Canada is a requirement for tenure. English-French bilingualism is an asset.

**The application should include:**

- an up-to-date resume,
- a sample of publications,
- the names and contact information of three respondents,
- a transcript for each university degree
- a cover letter that specifically indicates the coveted position and details your research program and interests in teaching.
