

## Limited Term Appointments – School of Education – St. Thomas University

The School of Education at St. Thomas University invites applications for two full-time Limited Term Appointments (LTA's) to begin July 1, 2023, renewable up to three years pending budgetary approval.

St. Thomas University is located in Fredericton, New Brunswick. It is an undergraduate, liberal arts institution with a fulltime enrolment of 1,800. Its students graduate with Bachelor of Arts, Applied Arts, Education, and Social Work degrees. Faculty members are distinguished teachers, researchers and scholars, and the university holds two Canada Research Chairs.

The School of Education is seeking applications from candidates who can demonstrate a strong record of teaching excellence and scholarly/professional/service contributions to the field of Education. In addition to teaching a broad range of courses within the Bachelor of Education program, the successful candidate(s) will contribute to program development, professional learning, and scholarly work within the teacher education program. Successful candidate(s) will further the School of Education's commitment to social justice, work effectively in a collaborative culture, participate in departmental and university service activities, build partnerships with public schools and community-based organizations, and support the needs of the School of Education.

### Requirements:

- A completed or near-completed PhD in Education is preferred, but consideration may be given to candidates who hold a Master's degree in Education;
- A Bachelor of Education and minimum of NB Teaching Certification Level VI or equivalent;
- A minimum of three years of successful, fulltime, contract teaching experience in K – 12 public education;
- Preference will be given to candidates who have teaching experience at the university level and/or extensive experience in an administrative and supervisory capacity related to the instruction of classroom teachers;
- An active or developing research agenda, publications, or other professional contributions in a related field;
- Experience working with culturally and linguistically diverse student populations, scholarship and/or experience working with BIPOC and/or 2SLGBTQIA+ communities will be considered assets.

**Applications must include:** (a) a cover letter outlining the applicant's teaching experience, scholarly interests and achievements, and potential contributions to the School of Education Bachelor of Education program as specified in the requirements listed above; (b) a curriculum

vitae; and (c) a teaching dossier that provides a statement of teaching philosophy and evidence of teaching effectiveness, and scholarly work related to their field of expertise. Three letters of reference are also required and should be sent in confidence directly from referees to Dr. Lisa Mitchell, Acting Director of the School of Education. **Closing Date:** March 1, 2023. Applicants are responsible for ensuring that their completed applications, including letters of reference, are received by the closing date. Only short-listed applicants will be contacted after the closing date.
